Lancaster Squadron 467 consisted of seven men: Pilot Cecil O'Brien, Flight Engineer Sergeant Douglas James Coombe, Navigator Sergeant Harold Boardley, Gerald Henry Sudds, William John Simpson, Joseph James Melli and Sgt Francis Herbert Doncaster. Squadron 467 and Sergeant William John Simpson flew to Berlin on 27th January 1944 at approximately 5.40pm.

The aircraft were placed in a dangerous position as Berlin was very overcast. The thick clouds hanging over the city meant that the Bomber Command were unable to track the exact whereabouts of the aircrafts and their corresponding squadrons. Following the raid, it was reported by local newspapers that 567 people in Berlin were killed in the course of the night, 132 of whom were foreign labourers.

The aircraft belonging to the squadron, Lancaster Bomber E539, was shot down over Berlin by the 1st Flak Division. The aircraft thereafter exploded, crashing at Berlin Köpenick. The crash site was confirmed at 8.38pm, when the aircraft was found at Wendenschloßstraße (Aircrew Remembered, 2023). The remains of the men were thereafter transported to the Olympia Lazarett (Olympic Village), to be buried at Elstal. Following the end of the Second World War, the bodies of the crewmembers were reburied at the 1939-1945 Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery in Berlin.

The Discovery

Flight Sergeant William John Simpson's remains, however, were never found. Simpson is therefore only commemorated by name at the Berlin 1939-1945 Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery and also at the memorial in Runnymede, Surrey, Great Britain.
